The sense of loss and heartbreak in the wake of this tragedy have been tremendous. However, with that loss also comes hope. It was because of your expertise, compassion and unending dedication that so many others survived.

To thank those that were integral in our hospitals response would be too many; in fact, it would be every Associate of the



Noted: Amy Rohaley Provides Compassionate Care

(This letter of appreciation is in praise of one of our contract nurses, Amy Rohaley, for the wonderful care she provided to the writer's sister, Gerogett Hobbs.)

I was called to El Paso as my sister, Gerogett Hobbs, fell, at home, and required emergency surgery for a brain bleed. She had surgery on the night of Friday 7/16 into Saturday 7/17. A follow up CT scan determined that she would not survive. My family gathered at the hospital on that Saturday morning

and remained throughout the day, holding a vigil for my sister. It was clearly a traumatic day for all of us. The decision was made to allow her to pass peacefully. She did. I must tell you about one of your nurses, Allison Rohaley. Ms. Rohaley was present throughout the day with her caring, compassionate presence. She was able to answer all of our questions. She tended to our needs in a gentle way. I knew, as the difficult day wore on, that my sister was in the best of care. How the day would end was inevitable and heart wrenching but Ms. Rohaley was so very comforting. Nursing is a difficult profession, Ms. Rohaley clearly made a commitment to her chosen career, and she has the gratitude of my entire family and myself. Please thank her for me.
